# YEAR IN REVIEW

In 2023, the Friends of Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore continued its support of the National Park Service team and their efforts to enhance the visitor experience at the park and preserve the Lakeshore for many years to come. Our commitments, both through volunteer hours and financial donations, would not have been possible without our tremendous volunteers and supporters! Thank you for your many hours of volunteering, donations and dedication to our mission in helping to preserve and protect this special place. Here is a look at some of the projects and programs that the Friends held and supported this year:



#### **PSAR**

For the second year in a row, the Preventative Search and Rescue (PSAR) team made contact with over 30,000 visitors. The group, who shares safety messaging and educates visitors on potential safety hazards in the park, stepped up to accomplish this

in place of a full-time NPS PSAR staff member. For the fifth straight year, the combined number of 911 calls and Search and Rescues finished the season at under 20. This was in part due to PSAR volunteers providing 44 hiker assists, preventing the need for more urgent responses through early PSAR intervention.

The team provided community support by participating in a variety of activities including Dune Safety Day, the Glen Arbor Fire Department Open House, offering support for law enforcement at the M22 Challenge and volunteering for the Glen Arbor Half Marathon and the Sleeping Bear Marathon. The team continues to seek volunteers who can share safety messages before visitors hike, bike or swim in the park.



### **Star Parties**

This year's Star Parties were a big hit! Many came out to observe and understand more about the night sky with the help of Park Rangers and the Grand Traverse Astronomical Society. This popular program continues to grow and is one of the reasons

the Friends and the park are seeking Dark Sky Certification. This certification will allow us to further protect the night sky from light pollution.



### Accessibility Program

Our Accessibility Program continues to grow year-overyear, expanding our commitment to providing even greater accessibility for all. With the addition of our third track chair, the team of volunteers was

able to help 60 visitors from Leelanau County to Germany and ages 10 to 91 experience the park! Thank you to our amazing volunteers who are fully committed to this program. These volunteers must accompany every use of these chairs and we've never had to cancel a hike due to not having a host!



# Snowshoe Program

The Friends and the NPS hosted 1,890 students for our Snowshoe Experience field trips last winter after several years' absence. Of those,

1,290 participated in the broader "Wandering the Watershed" curriculum arc. Designed for 3rd-5th graders, the arc involved a multi-touch approach of a synchronous or asynchronous pre-visit program, winter in-person field trip to the Lakeshore, beach-cleaning design challenge in the classroom using science, technology, engineering & math (STEM) kits, and a final inperson or virtual wrap-up visit. Almost all of the 1,890 students came from local schools within 50 miles of the Lakeshore.





# Adopt-A-Trail

This year was another busy season for Adopt-A-Trail hikers! While busy, 2023 was thankfully quieter than past seasons with very little intense weather events causing major issues on the trails. The Friends hosted a National

Trails Day event in June, which engaged over 130 visitors and seasoned volunteers to get out, hike a trail and to remind folks to "leave it better than you found it".



# Adopt-A-Beach

More than 100 Adopt-A-Beach volunteers spent 1,350 hours collecting over 2,300 pounds of trash from park beaches in 2023. Trash collected this year included cigarette butts, plastic pieces, balloons, personal hygiene

products, charcoal, a half-buried kayak and many more items. We thank these volunteers for their efforts and encourage everyone to leave no trace in the park.



## Sleeping Bear Heritage Trail Ambassador Volunteers

Eighty-four SBHT Ambassadors filed 843 reports logging a total of 2,012 hours on the Heritage Trail this year. Thank you all!

And a special thank you to the two eagle-eyed volunteers who spotted and reported the beginning of a small fire near the northern end of the Trail. In the end, 14 acres were burned. Containment was led by Glen Lake Fire and Rescue, and included participation by nine firefighting units from throughout Leelanau County.



# Yoga at the Beach

Yoga on the Beach had a great season in 2023, with beautiful weather and great participation. Every Friday from June through September, this fun program was held at the Maritime Museum in Glen Haven. The classes were

donation based and with many attendees (one class had a record breaking 66 attendees on the spacious beach) we were able to raise funds for the Friends.



## Piping Plover Conservation

The Friends continue to support the NPS team in their efforts to study and protect these special birds that call Sleeping Bear Dunes home. Piping plover are a threatened species and in order

to protect them, the park has a robust preservation and protection program specifically for the birds. The Friends aid these efforts by providing funds to hire NPS staff and purchase supplies like spotting scopes and volunteers. In 2023, the Friends were awarded \$10,000 from the *Top Family Foundation* and \$25,000 from the *Andrew R. and Janet F. Miller Foundation* for piping plover protection.



# **Dune Center Garage**

The Dune Center Garage is now complete! This project, several years in the making, was a priority project for both the Friends and the NPS. This solves storage issues for the NPS team by housing key equipment for

the park. The garage was funded by the Friends and through your generous donations.



# **Business Support**

Several area businesses stepped up to help the Friends through generous donations in 2023. Oryana Community Co-Op selected the Friends for their Groceries for Good program where a portion of the proceeds

from shoppers on September 14th were donated to the Friends! Cherry Republic, Northwoods Hardware, Crystal River Outfitters and many others contribute donations, time and space to the Friends' efforts.

# **New Grants**

This year has been a banner year for our Grants Team. The Friends apply for grants from charitable foundations that support national parks, natural resource preservation, outdoor education, and similar causes related to our mission. We received a total of \$66,500 in grants to spend on programs in the last fiscal year and this year, we have so far received almost \$161,800. Major donors who supported many of our programs have been the National Park Foundation, the Andrew R. and Janet F. Miller Foundation, the Top Family Foundation, the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, the Grand Traverse Regional Community Foundation, and the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation.
